- To top stitch
- To set-in pockets

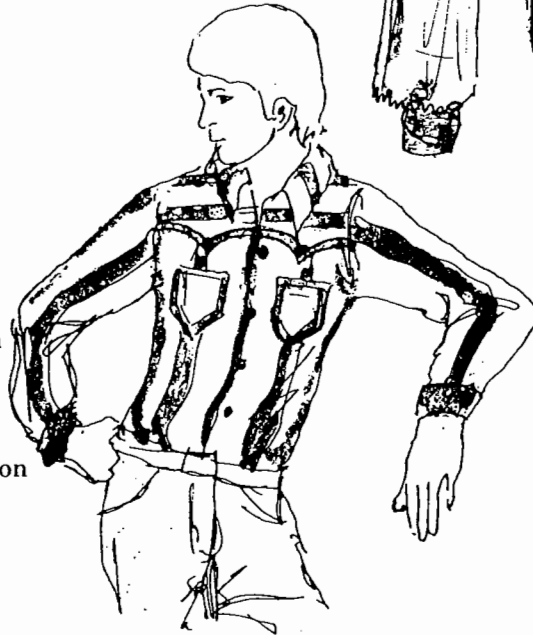
